Strategic Plan for Rogaining

A site has been set up to receive input for the strategic plan for rogaining. A number of people have joined, and comments are starting to be added. Further invitations will follow (contact the IRF if you have not been included yet and wish to contribute).

Background (February 2005 message)

The IRF is in the process of developing a new strategic plan for rogaining, and two early stages in this planning are now complete. Members were asked to provide details of rogaining activity in their own countries, this information was collated, and the results were then circulated for comment and revision with IRF Newsletter #95 in April 2004. Informal discussions at 6WRC in Arizona built on this

overview. These data then formed the basis of a more detailed summary of rogaining activities by country which was presented in IRF Newsletter #100.

Next stage: Internal and external analysis of our environment

Addressing some long term issues: VRA

After a decade of successful operation, the Victorian Rogaining Association was recognizing a series of trends that were not ideal for its future. Its average age profile was increasing sharply (average of early 20s in mid 1970s, to average of mid 30s in late 1980s), it was not attracting many junior teams, and its clientele was shifting from the traditional championship 24 hour rogaine to shorter events such that the 24 hour rogaine was at risk of attracting inadequate numbers if the trend did not reverse.

To address the shift away from the 24 hour event format, regular roganier and committee member Ivana Cichelli completed a project on rogaining for her Master of Business Administration degree. This involved understanding the different views and preferences of younger participants (e.g. Generation X [ed: maybe we need an update for Gen-Y]), and noting trends in other sports and outdoor activities (see IRF Newsletter #48).

A number of people were attending one rogaine and not returning to the sport, so Ben Cebon led an exercise to produce a Starter Pack aimed at people who were new to the sport and wanted to improve their skills and enjoyment level. Later, John Gavens and Heather Leslie initiated a Scouting / Venturers competition, and developed a number of contacts within the Scouting movement in Victoria that has meant this section has grown.

A specific Schools Rogaining competition was started in 1998, and has become the Victorian Schools Rogaining Championship. It is held on a weekend in parallel with a Saturday 6-hour rogaine for the public, a 6-hour rogaine for the public on Sunday, and a 5-hour Schools and Scouts competitions on the Sunday, all using a similar course. A total of 858 people were rogaing with the VRA on this weekend in 2005.

To maintain a connection with schools beyond the tenure of individual enthusiastic students, attempts have been made to closely involve key outdoor staff members at each school. Schools generally pay a VRA membership and cover the entry costs for each student. Before setting off, each team member has their planned route and their equipment checked by experienced rogaing, and receives advice on navigation, safety and planning.

Several areas have been selected as being particularly suitable for the Schools and Scouts rogaine, being close to Melbourne, having a safety net of roads surrounding 'junior friendly forest' with clear checkpoints and a gentle to moderate hills and minimal undergrowth. The School rogaine has progressed since 1998:

1998: 5 schools, 51 students
1999: 9-25
2000: 24-68 (13 Scouts additional to 68)
2001: 27-70 (77)
2002: 30-77 (52)
2003: 59-174 (34)
2004: 71-230 (25)
2005: 71-198 (44)

In addition, a new cadet section in 2005 attracted 10 participants and is likely to grow.

John and Jenny Sheahan have led the Schools rogaines for the VRA since 1998. There are

significant learnings that have come from running this program over eight years that John and Jenny would be happy to share with other rogaing who want to try similar programs in their own community. jsheahan@melbpc.org.au

ARA Rules sub committee

IRF input into this process has been useful for finding out about different practices in each country, and working towards universal international rules for the sport.

Mike Hotchkis, who is leading the review process for the ARA, advises that no decision was made at the recent ARA meeting to change the rules, and there will be some more discussion before any decision is made.
